Introduction

Shaping Our Future

The Manningham Community Panel consists of 40 residents from diverse backgrounds, cultures, and walks of life, representing the unique voices of our community. Over the course of six months, we met for six dedicated sessions, working collaboratively to discuss key priorities, challenges, and opportunities that will shape Manningham's future.

The purpose of these meetings was to refine and enhance the community vision while aligning with the Council's financial constraints. With a budget of \$147 million, difficult choices must be made to ensure the most valued services are prioritised. Our role was to determine these priorities and provide recommendations that will inform the new Council Plan, Asset Plan, and Financial Plan, ensuring they reflect the needs of our growing and evolving community.

This vision reflects Manningham's dynamic and growing population, including new migrants who need support to integrate seamlessly and an increasing aging demographic requiring tailored services. Sustainable growth is essential, particularly as housing demand rises. Council must ensure that development is balanced, with infrastructure and services expanding in line with population needs, where community safety is ensured. Thoughtful planning will maintain the quality of life while accommodating future growth in a responsible and sustainable manner.

Innovation is also a crucial pillar of our vision, requiring Council to adopt new, efficient ways of delivering services and engaging with the community. In an increasingly fast-paced world, leveraging technology and alternative communication methods will help ensure that all residents, regardless of background or access to traditional channels, stay informed and connected. By embracing innovation, sustainability, and inclusivity, Manningham can continue to be a thriving, forward-thinking community for generations to come.

Community Vision

Heading	Prioritising resources for seniors
Description	Increase resources in areas like living assistance, transportation, and social interactions in order to reduce loneliness and improve well-being.
Rationale	 What problem are you solving Many seniors experience loneliness and social isolation, which can lead to mental health issues like depression and anxiety. Factors include reduced mobility, loss of social networks, and lack of opportunities to engage with others. What are the benefits and costs (if known) Healthy and happy living Reduce potential the healthcare costs Acknowledge the trade off or compromise Reduction of the budget available for other community priorities, such as youth programs, infrastructure upgrades, or environmental initiatives. We would prefer to have seniors as first priority, socially disadvantaged as second priority and young people as third priority (based on current and fore cast demographics of the population growth in the municipality).

	 Manningham's local data, state-level health strategies, and global research on ageing populations.
	- Demographics data:
	 By 2036, the population of residents aged 60+ in Manningham is expected to grow significantly, with an increase of over 3,000 seniors compared to 2016.
	 Nearly 28% of the population is already aged 60 or over, compared to 24% in the Eastern Metropolitan Region and 20% in Greater Melbourne.
	- Health Challenges:
	- The incidence of dementia is projected to rise by over 100% by 2054, indicating a need for enhanced services to support cognitive health and care.
How does this recommendation relate to the remit?	1. Addressing Community Priorities
	 The remit asks the panel to inform the Council Plan, Asset Plan, and Financial Plan with guidance on service priorities. Enhancing senior services aligns with the panel's focus on addressing the needs of Manningham's growing and ageing population.
	 Seniors represent a significant and expanding demographic in Manningham. These initiatives directly address their needs for better mobility, social interaction, and living assistance.
	• Transport is a major concern for the elderly as a lack of transportation will prevent them from being able to attend the social activities they would like to participate in.
	 Social interactions defined in this case is about social participation which is about providing opportunities and connecting people (e.g. Youth3A).
	 In terms of priorities, transport would come first, social interactions come second and home safety comes third when it comes to allocation of resources and funding. Overall, these are considered to be prominent according to the Aged Care Framework Pillars via

	the WHO.
	2. Supporting Financial and Strategic Planning
	• The remit highlights the importance of allocating resources effectively to maximize community benefit within a constrained budget.
	 By targeting areas such as transportation, social interactions, and home safety, these recommendations address critical gaps in services for seniors, which can also reduce longer-term costs related to healthcare and emergency interventions.
How progressed do you expect this recommendation to be in 4 years time? (2028)	Full implemented

Heading	Investing in Community Safety
Description	Council should be proactive in identifying where risks to safety are higher. Additionally they should only approve plans that comply with Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) principles.
Rationale	Benefits:
	Improved Quality of Life:
	 Increased perceptions of safety can enhance residents' mental wellbeing and foster a sense of community.
	Reduced Crime Rates:
	 Investments in community policing, street lighting, and public surveillance can lower crime rates and deter criminal activities.
	Costs:
	If a CCTV system were in place
	Financial Investment:
	 Initiatives such as CCTV installation, police resourcing, and public infrastructure improvements require significant capital.
	Operational and Maintenance Costs:
	 Maintaining safety infrastructure, such as street lighting, monitoring systems, and safety personnel, entails ongoing expenses.
	However, CCTV should only be used once piloted and proved effective.

	Potential Trade-Offs:
	 Funding safety initiatives might divert resources from other essential services, such as education, housing, or public health.
	4. What evidence supports your recommendation?
	 In Croydon they tested an unsafe area with multiple different focus groups, i.e women and people with disabilities. They then took there feedback and applied CPTED principles to make it safer for all groups.
	 Financial Sustainability: The capital works program allocates funds to safety projects, balancing investment with budget constraints. For example, Manningham spends a portion of its \$2.7 billion in assets on safety-related infrastructure.
How does this recommendation relate to the remit?	 Roads and Infrastructure Service Description: Manages roads, footpaths, and street lighting to ensure safety and accessibility. Related Recommendations: Upgrading footpaths, streetlights, and traffic calming

Heading	Retaining existing and creating new and open spaces
Description	We need to ensure there is sufficient green or open space available for our residents and pets, especially in areas of high density development to include the following: Provision of shelter, BBQ, Playground, off-leash areas, exercise, and toilets facilities. Open spaces should be considerate of the Domestic Animal Management Plan which will be implemented.
Rationale	 Clean, green and watery spaces for residents to use and enjoy Green trees absorbing carbon emissions Provides habitual estate for wildlife Advocate for parks not under the direct jurisdiction by Council to be maintained to a high-standard too Providing and maintain welfare for pets and owners more areas/spaces to allow off-leash
How does this recommendati on relate to the remit?	Council needs to carry out detailed research into individual community populations and associated facilities within each individual park and make a plan of what is needed. This follows the execution of appropriate existing and/or new parks and facilities
How progressed do you expect this recommendati on .to be in 4 years time? (2028)	Plan and Start from now into the next 4 years to carry out research and implementation of the recommendations of the community expectations.

Heading	Increase Manningham Connectivity through Bus Service
Description	Advocate for improved bus services and routes to align with local community needs, particularly connecting key areas like activity centers, schools, universities and residential zones.
	Improving the frequency of the Manningham Bus Loop (Route 282) and route connecting more activity centres such as Jackson Court. The route currently does not extend to Warrandyte, Park Orchards and Wonga Park which are also in the Manningham Municipality.
	Expanding route to include suburbs/streets with a significant degrees of elevation (e.g. Dellfield Drive, Mayfair Ave)
Rationale	1. What problem are you solving:
	Enhancing residents' access to essential services and employment hubs.
	2. What are the benefits and costs (if known): Benefits - reduced traffic congestion, environment friendly.
	Costs: Building/maintaining bus stop infrastructure
	3. Acknowledge the trade off or compromise
	This requires a lot of time and communication in terms of collaborating with the State Government which may have delays.
	4. What evidence supports your recommendations
	 Manningham's population is growing and aging, with increasing reliance on public transport for mobility.
	 Enhanced bus services can support those without access to private vehicles, including young people, seniors, and low-income households.

	 Improving public transport like buses encourages people to shift from private vehicles, reducing traffic congestion and greenhouse gas emissions. Reliable and accessible bus services reduce stress associated with commuting
How does this recommendation relate to the remit?	Improved bus services help address the remit's goal of prioritising services that enhance liveability, inclusivity, and financial sustainability.

Heading	Address Cost Shifting
Description	To alleviate the financial pressures and burdens that Manningham council faces from the state government's cost shifting. This could be achieved by Manningham council clearly advocating for fundings requirements and responsibility to be agreed on before Council assumes responsibility for a service. This should apply to new and existing services.
Rationale	1 What problem are you solving?
	Trying to save money and spend it on other areas.

	Benefits:

	- Hard to negotiate, council needs the statistics to meet the inadequate funding that is currently provided

	3. Acknowledge the trade off or compromise
	Maintain the service quality to meet population growth, and look for ways to increase revenue to cover the cost of service levels as they continue to rise to meet growing demand:
	 Seek to reduce the cost of service delivery by considering alternative service delivery models. For example taking initiative to negotiate with other councils regarding shared services; or

	 Consider being less conservative by using excess reserve funds or consider loan borrowings to fund major infrastructure projects that provide inter-generational (long term) and use infrastructure funds to pay for these or other services; or
	- Further consult the community on a rate rise above the rate cap to continue providing services at levels that meet community growth and be financially sustainable.

Heading	Health and wellbeing support
Description	Implement and sustain a long-term program focused on enhancing the overall mental health and well-being of Manningham residents, with a particular emphasis on mental health, youth, and aging. For mental health, prioritise awareness through education, campaigns, and publications to support prevention efforts. Rather than directly providing services, the Council will play a key role in guiding and connecting residents to the support they need.
Rationale	Promoting health and wellbeing of the community
	Benefits: increase awareness about mental health and ageing health, and subsequent lifestyle changes.
	Costs: for workshops the cost of renting facilities to host the events, catering costs, and participant's cost.
	With an emphasis on the importance of fostering meaningful community engagement. Multigenerational workshops could provide opportunities for people of different ages to interact, share experiences, and develop mutual understanding, thereby enhancing social cohesion and reducing social isolation.
	There are rising mental health challenges across the population and a need for community participation and connection.
	An ageing population and a focus on youth engagement, could facilitate mutual support and skill-sharing between generations.

 Collaborative discussions with businesses to ensure upgrades align with their priorities while maintaining equity across centres.
2. Balanced Planning and Transparency:
 A phased upgrade plan was established to avoid perceived favoritism, with timelines for all centres, including older and more modern ones like Westfield Doncaster.
• Public sharing of progress updates and justifications for upgrade priorities to manage expectations.
3. Initial Implementation in Key Areas:
 Refurbishment work started at one or two centres identified as priorities through consultation, focusing on high-impact improvements.

Heading	Explore and unlock new revenue streams to add to the remit budget, from available resources (not just assets)
Description	Consider revenue generation, financially sustainable, and diversification of revenue streams. Council to conduct Strengths Weaknesses Opportunities Threats analysis of current assets to assess their utilization and identify opportunities for optimization or enhancement. This will guide the decision-making process in replacing outdated assets with new ones, ensuring they are both functional and appealing to all.
Rationale	Identify and unlock new potential revenue streams beyond existing assets, leveraging untapped resources and innovative opportunities to strengthen the remit budget. To ensure long-term financial sustainability, Manningham Council must explore innovative revenue opportunities beyond traditional funding sources. A strategic, enterprising approach to asset utilisation can unlock new income streams, strengthening the budget without compromising community services.
	One example is sporting pavilions , where there is potential to generate additional revenue through commercial partnerships, leasing arrangements, or expanded facility use. Similar opportunities exist across other Council-owned assets and services, which, if optimised, could provide a steady financial return.
	This recommendation encourages Council to adopt a business-minded approach , integrating entrepreneurship, investment strategies, and commercial acumen into financial planning. By shifting the mindset towards enterprise and return on investment, Council can strategically leverage its resources to maximise financial returns while maintaining public benefit .
	A well-structured revenue strategy ensures Council can continue delivering essential services, invest in community infrastructure, and reduce reliance on rate increases or external funding.

How does this recommendation relate to the remit?	Enhancing the remit by increasing the budget allows Council to achieve more of its goals and allocate additional resources toward community priorities. With a fixed budget of \$147 million, tough choices must be made. Unlocking new revenue streams expands the financial capacity to deliver essential services, invest in community initiatives, and support long-term sustainability without relying solely on rate increases.
How progressed do you expect this recommendation to be in 4 years time? (2028)	By 2028, this recommendation should be well-integrated into Council's financial strategy, with new revenue streams identified and some already generating returns. A formal review at the four-year mark will assess progress, refine strategies, and explore further opportunities for sustainable growth.

How does this recommendation relate to the remit?	 Access to essential services, food security, and domestic violence prevention are fundamental to fostering a healthy and equitable community in Manningham. To address these critical areas, we advocate for the following: Affordability to Access Services (Concessions): Ensuring affordable access to vital community services is essential, particularly for low-income households, seniors, and vulnerable groups. We propose expanding concession schemes and subsidised programs for health, recreational, and cultural services, which enable all residents to engage in community life without financial barriers. This support is vital in a municipality where 25% of households are classified as low-income and many face financial stress. Food Security: With rising living costs, food insecurity has become a growing challenge in Manningham. We recommend continued investment in partnerships with food relief organisations and the establishment of programs to provide emergency food and hygiene packs. Additionally, community education initiatives focusing on sustainable and affordable food practices can strengthen long-term

	food resilience for disadvantaged families.
	3. Addressing Domestic Violence: Domestic violence incidents, though below the state average in Manningham, remain a significant concern. We urge the enhancement of support networks for affected individuals, including access to emergency housing, counseling, financial support and advocacy services. It is equally important to invest in preventive programs that promote awareness and community engagement to break the cycle of violence.
	By addressing these areas through targeted strategies and programs, Manningham can continue building a resilient, inclusive, and supportive community that leaves no resident behind. Also Mannigham can advocate for community legal services too.
	These efforts will not only alleviate immediate hardships but also promote sustained wellbeing and equality across the municipality.
